And I can't imagine.

There are still lots of family farms, forests, lakes and streams. But as I get closer to the ground, the view changes. I'm finding it more difficult to pick out my house amid the clutter of development in Medina County. The area around I-71 and SR-18 is trying its best to look like the Montrose area at its worst. All along SR-18, east and west of I-71, the race is on to see which fast food joint can raise its banner highest. Litter on a stick. Denny's recently erected yellow sign can be seen from 10 miles away, a fact that no doubt brings joy to some marketing person's heart. I wonder, as we pass over the dwindling woodland around Lake Medina, how the sign looks at night to migrating birds. On the ground, the hodgepodge of buildings seems to have no rhyme or reason. Piles of sticks and bricks.

So where is this diatribe headed? The good or evil of development is a matter of perspective. Those who embrace development are enriched, at least in some materialistic way. For those of us who think otherwise, we'd better learn to adapt and adopt if we want to be around for the next migration. Like birds, to survive we must change our perspective, seek out what we like best and look at new things for our enrichment.

Toward that end, this year's line-up of monthly programs will take you to places you've never been. We'll introduce you to creatures — two-legged, four-legged and no-legged — you've not met before. Join us each month as we explore the diversity of the natural

world. I guarantee it will change your perspective. Do you know the hummingbird's role in pollination?

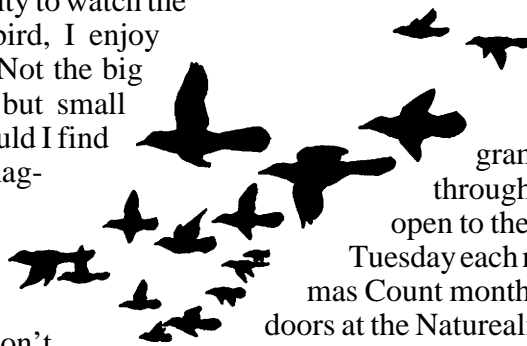
Climb On Board the Ark

Leo's Ark

November 23rd

The World of Bats

For more than 30 years Greater Akron Audubon (formerly the Cuyahoga Falls Bird Club) has participated in the National Audubon Society's Christmas Bird Count. Wild Bird Seed Sale

It's time for our annual wild bird seed sale, slated for October 26-29. It's a bold, exciting new plan, the kind of thing required as we move toward a new century. This is your chance to make life a bit easier for the birds, add some color to our drab northeast Ohio winter landscape, and support a critical education program. The seed sale is the chapter's only fund raiser. The money generated from this effort goes directly to our support of the Audubon Adventures program. Audubon Adventures is an educational program designed for elementary school children. Through your purchases of wild bird seed we provide science-based environmental literature and videos to about 20 classrooms in the chapter area. Lloyd Bresely has done an outstanding job of administering this program for us for several years.

The format of the seed sale will be a bit different this year. Since this event is the chapter's **only** fund raising event, the executive committee is striving to make it as profitable as possible. You will be able to pre-order your seed via telephone, fax, computer or in person! We're embarking on this program with Wild Bird Center in Fairlawn to offer the highest-quality seed available in the Akron area. We will also be extending the pick-up time to three days, November 5-7 to avoid any weather problems. Wild Bird Center will be giving you 10 percent off the retail price of what you buy, and generously donating a percentage of the **gross sales** (from this fund raiser) to our chapter so that we can continue our educational efforts.

On this page you'll find a list of products available and descriptions, as well as prices. You can simply call in your order, mail or FAX the form, or order via the store's Web site. The pick-up (and payment!) dates will be November 5-7. A recent study showed that about 65 million people, or 43 percent of the U.S. households, provide food for wild birds.
