JB is a rarity-finding machine and is forever obsessed with gulls, jaegers and lake-watching. Admiration and respect for birds runs deep through her blood. She is honored and humbled to take a stand for bird conservation and education with her every last breath.

Nancy will present on her latest publication, Wildscape: Trilling Chipmunks, Beckoning Blooms, Salty Butterflies, and other Sensory Wonders of Nature. Much has been written about gardening for human senses, but how do plants and animals perceive the world around them? Conventional gardening practices often interfere with animals' and plants' abilities to interact with their environment in ways we can scarcely imagine. In addition to a variety of birding excursions, the festival provides family-oriented programming, food, music and camping. Enjoy the rolling hills of Appalachia filled with wildflowers, medicinal forest species, and a variety of birds. Think in terms of a gathering of friends who enjoy birding together. There are always several very good birders present and we all help one another find and identify species. Meet at the bridge nearest the Tuscarawas Meadows parking lot. The first leg of the walk is always along the feeder race and we walk slowly, so it is easy for late arrivals to find us. Birders can arrive and leave at any time, and the trails are well groomed (but can be wet and muddy) and flat. Bring binoculars and birding geniality. The third Saturday walk on May 11th will be held in celebration of International Migratory Bird Day – that recognizes the northward journey of migratory species from their southerly wintering grounds to their northerly nesting sites. The Migratory Birds of the Americas Act Passes the U.S. House of Representatives



We have lost 3 out of every 5 Rufous Hummingbirds since 1970, reflecting an urgent need for on-the-ground conservation of both their winter habitat in Mexico and summer habitat in the United States.

On Tuesday, April 9th, the bipartisan *Migratory Birds of the Americas Conservation Enhancements Act* (H.R. 4389/S. 4022), nicknamed Neotrops, passed the U.S. House of Representatives! This critical legislation is intended to protect habitat for birds throughout their breeding, migration, and wintering habitats in North, Central, and South America. The bill reauthorizes the Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation Act (NMBCA), a successful federal grants program funding migratory bird research and habitat restoration throughout the Western Hemisphere.

The staff at National Audubon wish to thank everyone who advocated for the passage of this bill. Our collective support is what helped push this piece of legislation over the finish line and they're grateful for our advocacy. Rep. Joyce (R-OH, 14th District) co-sponsored this legislation.

The next step is to thank your U.S. Representative and encourage your senators to support the bill—and the folks at National Audubon have combined those two efforts into one action alert: AUDUBON ALERT: Help Migratory Birds Across the Western Hemisphere

BirdNote Episode from April 12, 2024

Spark Bird: John Kessler and the Music of Birds



John Kessler served as BirdNote's senior producer for over 18 years. But before BirdNote existed, he was recording the sounds of Seattle for public radio station KPLU, now called KNKX. After capturing many of Seattle's well-known spots on tape, he broadened his scope by connecting with local birders to find the best places to hear birds around town. Shortly after, BirdNote's founder, Chris Petersen, sought out John's musical ear to help create a sound-rich show highlighting the joy of birds. It's Time to Get Our Hummingbird Feeders Out!

It seems that the northward journey of the **Ruby-throated Hummingbird** is a couple of weeks ahead of schedule this year. Their first appearance in northeast Ohio usually happens at the end of April, but several sightings have already occurred as of the week of April 15th this year (see Hummingbird Central 2024 Migration map: 2024 hummingbird spring migration map, 2024 hummingbird sightings, hummingbird tracker, migration patterns, migration times (hummingbirdcentral.com)). It is usually recommended that we get our feeders out a week ahead of their expected arrival but those in the know are getting them out now.
