


## **Upcoming Programs and Events**

The Tiny South American Republic of Ecuador is home to a surprisingly exceptional natural bounty due in no small part to its location and geography. Conservation International has named Ecuador the most biodiverse nation on earth. But this reality faces challenges that, sadly, pose serious threats to the sustainability and long-term survival of the wealth of ecosystems, habitats and species that are found within this nation's reduced territory. Beyond its impressive numbers of resident species, Ecuador hosts many boreal and austral migrants. So how do we confront and combat these threats, that not only affect this country, but also impact our North American partners, like Ohio? A number of successful concepts, ideas and strategies have been put into practice by the Mindo Cloudforest Foundation.

Proceeds from the sale of the Wildlife Legacy Stamp are used to support endangered and threatened native species, habitat restoration, land purchases, conservation easements and educational materials for students and wildlife enthusiasts.



Additionally, Kendra Wecker, Chief of Ohio's Division of Wildlife, has issued a message to all concerned Ohioans about the RAWA (Recovering America's Wildlife Act):

"...Unfortunately, threats to our fish, wildlife, and their habitats exceed the

resources available to conserve them. Existing federal funding was never designed to meet the needs of all species, particularly those declining but not yet threatened. Currently our state receives approximately \$1.4M a year for these efforts. This funding is insufficient to successfully conserve and manage the more than 400 identified species of conservation need in Ohio. If the Recovering America's Wildlife Act passed, Ohio would receive up to \$30M and that would allow us to protect those species, conserve the full diversity of wildlife, and improve our natural resources. ..."

Discover the cardinal rule of nature – everything is connected - at the 37th annual Ohio Wildlife Diversity Conference. Hosted by the ODNR Division of Wildlife, the conference will be held virtually on Friday, March 5th. The conference is available **free of charge** to all registrants.

The conference will feature three outstanding presenters, who will be available for live Q&A sessions after each talk. Presentations will feature the road to recovering North American birds, as well as the lesser-known world of Ohio's millipedes and freshwater snails.

### About the Wildlife Diversity Conference

Ohio's event is the largest single-day wildlife diversity conference in the country. The first Ohio Wildlife Diversity Conference was held at The Ohio State University in 1985 with 40 people in attendance. In 2020, approximately 1,000 people attended the daylong event.
