Conservancy and consists of 1,200 acres of ideal habitat for waterfowl and waterbirds.

Permanently conserved in 2015, the Land Conservancy has restored the site from

historical high impact uses (agriculture, mining, and aquaculture) to a natural, 3-mile long,

flow-through wetland complex. Utilizing funds from Clean Ohio, USFWS, and the Ohio

EPA, \$3.5M was invested in the property to restore this ancient Tamarack Swamp.





The Cornell Lab Young Birders Event 2024

June 27 – 30, 2024



This 4-day event, held in Ithaca, NY, aims to bring together teenagers with a passion for birds and an interest in pursuing a career that connects with birds. You'll meet people who

have successful careers that involve birds in a variety of ways from ecologists and artists, to audio specialists and computer scientists.

All high school-aged birders from anywhere in the world are invited to apply (students entering grades 9-12 in the fall). You do not need to be an expert birder to apply – we're looking for students with a passion for birds who want to learn about careers in ornithology! Sixteen young birders will be chosen by late March and slight preference is given to students entering 12th grade and students who have previously applied.

Tuition costs \$600 and includes lodging, food, and transportation to birding sites during the weekend. Travel expenses to and from Ithaca are not covered in the tuition. The Cornell Lab also has scholarships available and can help coordinate additional support for travel. Binoculars are also available to those who need them.

The Cornell Lab is a welcoming community that values and respects teenagers from all backgrounds and identities. Through this event, The Lab strives to foster a birding community where everyone feels they belong.

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Open House Update on the Progression of the Former Brandywine Golf Course Site Plan

If you were unable to attend the February 24th presentation about the conceptual site plan for the former Brandywine Golf Course, it is now available on the Conservancy's website. During that meeting, representatives from Studio Zewde, the landscape architects for the

project, shared an update since the last open house in December. A number of big concept ideas were presented; at the heart of them was shifting Akron Peninsula Road away from the river's edge to expand safe site access to the Cuyahoga River, protect the river's edge from further erosion and improve the overall quality of the watershed. 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### Grocery Chains to Ban Use of Neonics by Suppliers, in Move to Protect Pollinators


American Bird Conservancy has championed the widespread halt of the use of neonics for over a decade, but now our grocers are realizing that these toxic pesticides are also as much a threat to biodiversity collapse and our own food supply as climate change. Whole Foods and Kroger top the list of national grocers who are forcing food and flower growers to comply with a ban on neonicotinoids. And other grocers such as Giant Eagle, Walmart, Aldi, Costco, CVS, Dollar Tree, Meijer, Rite Aid, and Target are implementing policies that encourage reduced use of these chemicals but without targeted metrics.

Because the Environment for the Americas' theme for 2024 is Insects, we welcome any news that allows for pollinators and other insect to thrive as we appreciate the role they play in the lives of birds, especially migratory birds. Neonics work by attacking the nervous system in insects (and the birds that eat those insects), leading to paralysis and death in higher doses. At smaller doses, Natural Resources Defense Council reported that these pesticides can still weaken the immune system, memory, stamina and reproduction of insects and keep pollinators from pollinating crops. 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#### An App That Helps You Hear High-Pitched Bird Songs



Lang Elliott, professional nature recordist, is featured in this March 1, 2024 item from BirdNote®. "For years, nature recordist Lang Elliott came up with clever ways to hear high-pitched bird songs despite his high-frequency hearing loss. Lang teamed up with a programmer to develop a mobile app called *Hear Birds Again*. Currently it's only available for iPhones, but it's able to take high-pitch bird songs and shift them down into a lower range.
