Organized by the Black AF in STEM Collective, the week seeks to support, uplift, and amplify Black STEM professionals in natural resources and the environment through professional development, career connection, and community engagement. The collective also aims to inspire new audiences to engage in nature and share the stories of Black conservationists from across the African diaspora. Ohio Woodland Stewards Program (Webinar) Friday, June 2, 2023 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. A Potential New Nemesis for Garlic Mustard? Identifying and Reporting a Newly-Arrived Garlic Mustard Specialist Aphid- Lipaphis alliariae

Note: While not directly related to birds, this topic may be of great interest to those interested in biodiversity and the ecologically destructive forces that invasive species wreak on bird habitat.



Join Holden Arboretum's Natural Areas Biologist Rebecah Troutman to learn more about a newly discovered enemy of the invasive garlic mustard. This webinar will teach

participants how to find and identify *Lipaphis alliariae*, a garlic mustard specialist aphid native to Europe. This aphid was found during the 2021 field season. Affected plants produced twisted seed pods and puckered/wilted leaves. Given the importance of controlling garlic mustard, the novel nature of the newly discovered aphid in the United States, we are trying to better understand the impact this species has on garlic mustardcould it be a desperately needed biocontrol agent? #### National Audubon's Summer Climate Watch is Underway!

The next Climate Watch survey season will run from May 15 to June 15. A new(er) ongoing community science program explores how North American birds are responding to climate change. Help build a better world for birds by joining Climate Watch to test and improve climate models. Our Climate Watch coordinator is Mary Anne Romito, from Western Cuyahoga Audubon Society and **Saturday, June 3, 2023 8:00 a.m. to noon** has been chosen as their big day to come out and do the survey. There are still survey squares that have not been assigned in Summit County. If you can identify bluebirds, nuthatches, goldfinches, or towhees by sight and sound, or are eager to learn, put your bird knowledge to use and help conduct surveys to see how these species are already responding to climate change in our area. Even if June 3<sup>rd</sup> isn't feasible for you, it's still possible to participate as long as the counts are done within the above timeframe. ## Wood Thrush as Ohio's State Bird?

While "playing" with eBird data as a hobby, Matt Smith, an applications programmer for the Macaulay Library at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, thought that more aptly-chosen state birds may be suggested based on "how much of a bird species' global population occurs in each state or province at a given time of year." Ohio's state bird, the Northern Cardinal,

is also the state bird of six other states (Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, and North Carolina). By prioritizing breeding-season stats and selecting a different bird species for each state without duplication, Smith's thought experiment suggested that the Wood Thrush may be a better choice for Ohio's state bird because "with 8.2% of the global population breeding in Ohio, the second highest percentage of any state, Ohio also has the third-highest population density of Wood Thrush during the breeding season."

### Song Recordings of Migrating Mourning Warblers

Below is Dr. Jay Pitocchelli's request to Ohio birders, as posted on the Ohio Listserv, a service provided by the Ohio Ornithological Society.

I am posting my annual opportunity to participate in a Citizens Science Project that involves recording migrating Mourning Warbler songs. I am trying to determine the nature of migratory pathways taken by different song populations of Mourning Warbler males during their spring migration. I am continuing to collect your recordings and plot them on a map of North America to determine if and where birds with different song types (regiolects) separate from each other during spring migration. The most current map of songs of migrants is at the web site below.

# Audubon Introduces a Redesigned Bird Guide App



The Audubon Bird Guide is a *free* and complete field guide to over 800 species of North American birds, right in your pocket. Built for all experience levels, it will help you identify the birds around you, keep track of the birds you've seen, and get outside to find new birds near you. The Bird ID functions much like Cornell Lab's Merlin App and contains photos, range maps, audio clips and in-depth text by Kenn Kaufman. The Sightings feature allows one to keep a record of birds seen and the app interfaces with eBird to let you know where nearby birding hotspots are with real-time eBird posts.
