Many warbler species, after breeding, adopt a more cryptic plumage that probably helps them survive in their real home in the tropics. This talk will discuss a range of strategies for identifying warblers that, in the Fall, look more similar to other species. Freshwater Science: Do Islands Help Birds Migrate Across Lake Erie?

(Webinar) Wednesday, September 13, 2023

12:00 p.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Many migratory songbirds cross Lake Erie during their nocturnal migrations. However, it's uncertain how the topography of the island archipelago in the central-western basin of the lake might influence the flight paths of these migratory birds.

Dr. Verner Bingman from Bowling Green State University has been investigating how nocturnally migrating songbirds use the islands as visual guideposts to maintain preferred flight directions, compensate for the negative effects of wind drift and potentially serve as landing refuge as birds end their migration on a given night.

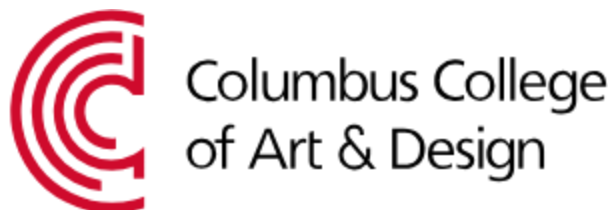

Cuyahoga Valley National Park's Education, Interpretation & Visitor Services needs your input on two important interpretive and education projects. The first is a major update to the interpretive themes that guide their programs, exhibits, website, social media, and publications. They've drafted a **new overview of the national park's main story as well as its supporting stories** in preparation for CVNP's 50th anniversary in 2025 and the America 250th anniversary in 2026.

The second project is a **plan to replace the outdoor exhibits at Brandywine Falls, Ledges, Octagon, and Kendall Lake**. These exhibits will reflect the new interpretive themes, create new arrival areas at Brandywine Falls and Ledges, and anticipate a proposed new wheelchair-accessible Ledges Overlook Trail. 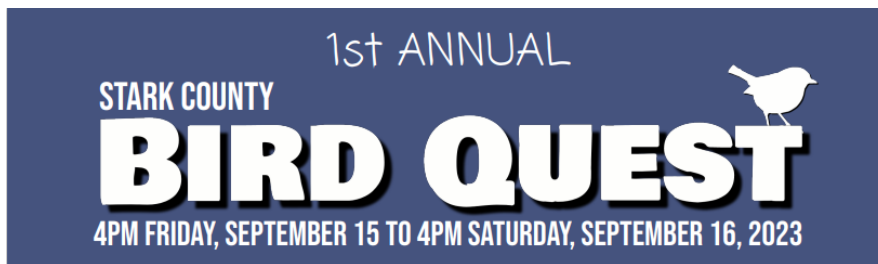
After 10 – 12 years of watching and often counting Chimney Swifts entering various large chimneys to roost for the night after breeding is over and during fall migration, doing so without using any planned scientific method, we decided to look at our eBird archived data from these counts to determine whether anything we observed could be analyzed, interpreted or construed such that these data might contribute something, if anything, to

the scientific literature. Issues, both positive and negative during these counts, and conclusions from the data analysis will be discussed and drawn, as simple as they may be.

Black Swamp Observatory Nets Oldest Documented Eastern Wood-Pewee

Black Swamp Bird Observatory actively participates in a program called MAPS, or Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship, which focuses on breeding birds. MAPS, coordinated by the Institute for Bird Populations, is a continent-wide banding scheme where stations throughout the country all follow the same protocol to collect data on the birds that breed in their area. The breeding season is separated into ten-day periods, and banding occurs on one day during each of those periods. BSBO runs two MAPS stations: one at the BSBO office in Magee Marsh and one in Oak Openings Preserve Metropark.

BSBO's most exciting bird this summer, perhaps, was a return Eastern Wood-Pewee (EAWP). From their most recent news: "We hear EAWPs singing their heads off every week at Oaks, but this was the first (and only) that we'd had in the nets. And boy, was it a doozy! 'It's just a wood-pewee,' you say, 'What's so interesting about that?' Well, it's neat partly because we just don't get that many recaptured or return flycatchers. Secondly, this particular bird was banded as an after-hatching-year (AHY) in 2014, making it at least 10 years old and setting a new longevity record for the species! This is actually the second longevity record that has come from Oaks, the first being a 10-year-old Blue Grosbeak back in 2017.

Advocacy Opportunities:

Take Action to Protect the Great Lakes

As part of the Audubon Great Lakes (AGL) region, our chapter participates in monthly meetings that brief us on actions that we all can take to support the conservation goals of our organization. The Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) was developed by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to support and fund efforts that address the biggest climate threats to the Great Lakes, guiding billions of dollars to coastal wetland restoration and conservation. Every five years the EPA creates a five-year GLRI Action Plan and it is now looking for public input to help guide the restoration efforts for 2025 through 2029 in the GLRI Action Plan IV. AGL staff have created a fresh action alert urging the EPA to take action to make birds and wildlife a priority. 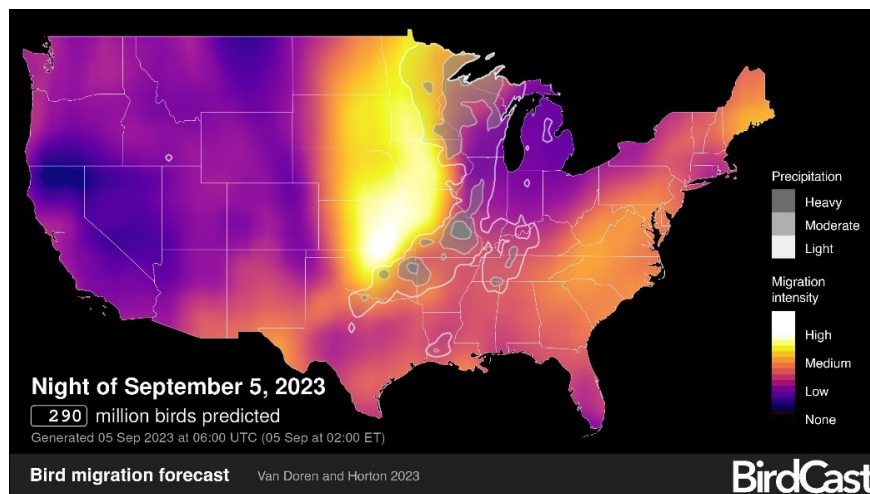
Help Stop Fracking in our Ohio State Parks

A new state law (H.B. 507) is now in effect requiring Ohio's state parks and public lands to be leased to oil and gas industry for fracking. Applications are underway with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources' Oil and Gas Land Management Commission (OGLMC) to frack at sites including Salt Fork State Park, Wolf Run State Park and Zepernick and Valley Run wildlife areas in eastern Ohio ([Nominations – Save Ohio Parks](#)). Fracking essentially pollutes the air and water, destroys the environment and accelerates climate change. These operations release greenhouse gases, including methane gas, into the air that contribute to rising temperatures and accelerate climate change. Fracking also requires from one to ten millions of gallons of fresh water per fracked well to be drained from rivers, lakes and streams – water that is effectively taken from the drinking water supply forever. Proprietary toxic chemicals are used during the water extraction part of the fracking process and these chemicals are unregulated by the state of Ohio and the federal government. These chemicals include benzene and PFAs, which have been found in injection storage sites in Athens County, Ohio. PFAs are linked to birth defects and cancers, among other health issues.

An Ohio group called **Save Ohio Parks** has recently been in touch with Ohio Audubon chapters and is asking us to educate ourselves as birders and to write emails to the OGLMC asking commissioners to deny fracking in and under Ohio state parks and public lands. They have a website ([Save Ohio Parks – No fracking on public lands](#)) that has detailed information on fracking and includes newer scientific research and reports. The deadline to request that fracking be denied at Salt Fork State Park is September 25th. Emails should be sent to Commission.Clerk@oglmc.ohio.gov.

Use BirdCast to Inform during Fall Migration

BirdCast is not new this year but this is a reminder to use this free interactive website to inform your birding and vigilance in window protection (such as drawing blinds or curtains during times when heavy migratory traffic is expected). The joint project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, Colorado State University, and the University of Massachusetts Amherst, uses a combination of machine learning, cloud-based computing, big data analytics, and data from the National Weather Service’s 160 Doppler radar stations to predict bird movements across the continent. Use the Migration Dashboard to see how many birds flew over your county last night and what speed, direction and altitude they were flying at over the course of the night time hours. Other tools include local bird migration alerts, and live migration maps. Use these amazing, powerful tools now through the end of fall migration (November 15th): [BirdCast - Bird migration forecasts in real-time](#).



The Healing Our Waters – Great Lakes Coalition is a coalition of local, state, and regional advocates working together to establish Great Lakes restoration and protection as a national conservation priority. This year, their conference will be held in Cleveland, Ohio on October 12 – 13, and will bring people together from the eight-state region to focus on seven priority areas that range from habitat destruction to environmental injustice.

Organizations such as National Wildlife Federation, Audubon Great Lakes, Western Reserve Land Conservancy, and the Ohio Environmental Council are sponsors of the event and field trips will include areas in Cleveland Metroparks, Cuyahoga Valley National Park and the Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath Trail. **2023 Ohio Avian Research Conference to be held at Grange Insurance
Audubon Center October 14, 2023 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.**



The Ohio Bird Conservation Initiative (OBCI) has announced that the full-day event will include an optional field trip, a full day of scientific presentations, and a keynote presentation by Dr. Nathan W. Cooper, Research Ecologist with the Migratory Bird Center at Smithsonian's National Zoo and Conservation Biology Institute.

Dr. Cooper will present his research on the Kirtland's Warbler. Over the past few decades, Kirtland's Warblers have undergone a remarkable recovery, from just 167 males in the world in 1987 to more than 2,200 males today. In addition to having a compelling conservation story, its small population size and restricted breeding and winter ranges provide a truly unique opportunity to learn more about the fascinating and interconnected annual cycles of songbirds. Cooper's program will explore the annual cycle of the Kirtland's Warbler and share what has been learned from this rare species.
