

2018 GREATER AKRON AUDUBON SOCIETY SUMMER BREEDING BIRD CENSUS SUMMARY

The 2018 Summer Breeding Bird Census of Summit County was once again very successful, due to the many dedicated and talented local birders devoting their time and effort to this yearly census started in 1978 by Carol Tveekrem.

With a census dating back 41 years, one can see population trends of individual species, which ones are decreasing, which ones are holding steady, and which ones are showing successful increases. The census has the entire county divided up into 30 areas and once again we had coverage in all 30 areas. Summit County has a nice diversity of habitat even with a city the size of Akron and its suburbs dominating the heart of the county. Progress can't be halted, but thankfully we are lucky enough to have the Cuyahoga Valley National Park north of Akron to the Summit/Cuyahoga County Lines as well as Summit Metro Parks within the entire county, ensuring suitable habitat for years to come, as the national park's boundaries are well-defined and Summit Metro Parks continues to purchase greenspace throughout the county, to add to their already established parks that we've all come to know and love over the years.

This year, over the 10-day count period in June, we recorded 135 species within the county, second only to last year's record of 138 species. We added four new species to the overall checklist giving us 195 species recorded within Summit County since 1978. Those new species added are Trumpeter Swan, Northern Shoveler, Common Merganser, and Yellow-bellied Flycatcher. We also set a new high for total birds counted with 37,002, besting last year's 36,960 total birds. A total of 81 volunteers put in 513 hours and 23 minutes over the count period, the second-highest time afield in the history of the census. Dedicated indeed!

Many new highs for species were recorded this summer as well as a couple that tied all-time highs. New all-time highs were set for Double-crested Cormorant, Green Heron, Turkey Vulture, Osprey, Bald Eagle, Red-headed Woodpecker, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Pileated Woodpecker, Acadian Flycatcher, Eastern Phoebe, Blue Jay, Barn Swallow, Carolina Wren, Hooded Warbler, Chipping Sparrow, Song Sparrow, Dark-eyed Junco, and Orchard Oriole. We tied the all-time high for Broad-winged Hawk and, amazingly enough, Red-winged Blackbird. We also had a couple of species that have only been seen for the second time ever since 1978, Black Tern and Common Tern, both seen at Nimisila Reservoir in the southern part of the county. Nimisila Reservoir is now part of the Summit Metro Parks, no longer being held by the state as an Ohio State Park, and should be strongly considered as a candidate for an Important Bird Area. Both Brian Tinker and Joanne Priest have been pulling some really amazing finds out of this large reservoir in Area #30. In May, Joanne found a Purple Gallinule there that unfortunately could not be found during the 10-day count period.

Species like Great Blue Heron and Turkey Vulture are probably over-counted due to their roaming nature, but who can really say? Are there really 13 Bald Eagles in Summit County? Hard to say as well, but nests continue at both Bath Nature Preserve and Nimisila Reservoir, and Ann & Marty Gulbransen found a new nest this year in Area #18 near Barberton Reservoir. Osprey numbers continue to grow, an unbelievable success story far beyond just the Portage Lakes Area. A miscommunication between the Akron Zoo volunteers resulted in parts of downtown Akron as well as Goodyear Heights Metro Park not being counted this year, or the record high for Canada Goose would have fallen, and Michelle and I had 3 of the downtown Akron Peregrine Falcons in July after the count period, which could have given us at least 7 this year once combined with Dwight & Ann Chasar's family group at the Ohio Turnpike bridge in Area #2, just one shy of tying the all-time high.

Common Merganser sightings are up, further proof that the Cuyahoga River is much better than it has been in recent memory and two sightings of Ruddy Duck were only the fourth records ever on the history of the census. Other questions to ponder would be if the increase in new highs for four woodpecker species is in any way related to the death of ash trees due to the emerald ash-borer? Is the downward spiral of Common Night-hawks and American Kestrels irreversible? If not, what can be done? Are the Trumpeter Swan sightings in any way related to the drop in Mute Swan numbers? No "wild/feral" Mute Swans were found this year, joining 12 other species seen last year, but missed this summer, proving that you just never know what might show up during the "summer" in Summit County.

First-time volunteers this year include Megan Buchanan and Kevin White, taking over the formerly "open" Area #11, which includes the Gorge Metro Park and much of residential Cuyahoga Falls, and Larry Pinkus, taking over the formerly "open" Area #23 that includes part of the Portage Lakes Area and Summit Metro Parks Towpath Trail from Waterloo Rd. south into Barberton. This leaves us with only three "open"

areas without a leader, so, once again, if you know of anyone interested in taking over an area to census in 2019 and beyond, feel free to contact us and we'll give you all the specifics. These areas are Area #8, which includes the Hardy Rd. area and Summit Metro Parks Hampton Hills Mountain Bike Area off of Theiss Rd. on the Cuyahoga Falls/Akron border. Area #12, which includes Crystal Lake, Silver Lake, Kent St. Airport, and the length of the Cuyahoga River from Silver Lake east to the Summit/Portage County Lines, easily accessible by way of Summit Metro Parks Bike & Hike Trail from Silver Lake, through Munroe Falls and Stow. And finally, Area #25 in the Mogadore area, that includes the Gilchrist Rd. area and Mogadore Lions Park. All free to a good home and ownership!

Our goal is to get these areas volunteers so that Michelle and I can concentrate on our area, Area #28 that includes the PPG Lime Lakes south of Barberton and Summit Metro Parks Towpath Trail from Barberton south to the Summit/Stark County Lines south of Clinton. Our relationship with PPG is outstanding and they are opening up even more of their property for us to census, so all 10 days of coverage will be paramount to our success. PPG has also expressed an interest into opening up Lime Lake #4 and Lime Lake #5 to access to Greater Akron Audubon Society for future fieldtrips, so if any of you are interested you can e-mail us and we can keep you updated as to what's in the works down the road. Exciting finds seen at the Lime Lakes in the past have been Sedge Wren, Dickcissel, Bobolink, and Eastern Meadowlark, and Lime Lake #4 hosted our only Western Meadowlark recorded on the census in 2004.

Well, that about wraps it up for this year's census. What follows is a rundown of the total species with comments about each one, a few other facts included, a list of our dedicated army of volunteers, and a breakdown of all 30 areas. Also attached are some photos from Joanne Priest, Brian Tinker, and myself that highlight some of this year's finds.
